















GRAAMA PANCHAYATH AROGYA AMRUTHA ABHIYAANA

A convergence initiative to strengthen Gram Panchayat leadership to ensure the health of last mile communities

BACKGROUND

Gram Panchayats are the centres of village administration, development, and health and family welfare, with immense potential to provide decentralized services that can improve the health and well-being of villagers by gauging the public health requirements of rural areas, expanding access to healthcare services, and leveraging community networks to meet the needs of the most vulnerable and unreached populations. It is only when such healthcare services reach the underserved in the rural pockets of the nation that India can hope to reach its goal of reducing the burden of Covid-19, Tuberculosis (TB) and Non-communicable diseases (NCDs). Fortifying rural areas to combat these threats through the empowerment of Gram Panchayats and health functionaries is essential to mitigate existing and emerging threats to the health of people.


With this view, the Government of Karnataka established Gram Panchayat Covid Task Forces to address the immediate challenge of the Covid-19 pandemic, especially in rural Karnataka. These were envisaged to function as Gram Panchayat Health Task Forces, their role evolving with an expanded mandate to address all major health initiatives across maternal and child health, communicable and non-communicable diseases like TB, diabetes, hypertension and other general ailments. This vision of the Gram Panchayat Health Task Force, currently known as the Gram Panchayat Task Force, is the strengthening of community ownership of different health programs at the panchayat level. This aligns with the objective of the flagship Ayushman Bharat program under the National Health Mission (NHM) of achieving universal access to equitable, affordable and quality health care which is accountable and responsive to the needs of people.

The National Tuberculosis Elimination Programme (NTEP), Karnataka, is also initiating the Kshaya Muktha Gram Panchayat (TB-free Gram Panchayat) initiative as part of its ambitious Kshaya Muktha Karnataka (TB-free Karnataka) campaign. By involving the members of Gram Panchayats, there will be a better understanding of the disease from the community perspective, an impetus for the early detection of cases and early initiation of treatment, community support to enable adherence by reducing stigma, and support to nutrition and treatment completion for better outcomes


These initiatives highlight the importance of the Gram Panchayat as the most significant decentralised self-governing body, which can ensure and implement the "health for all" approach at the grassroots. KHPT is supporting the Government of Karnataka, namely the Departments of Rural Development and Panchayat Raj (RDPR) and Health and Family Welfare to implement the Graama Panchayath Arogya Amrutha Abhiyaana, which aims to enhance the capacities of Gram Panchayats to more proactively address issues of public health in rural Karnataka.

The Graama Panchayath Arogya Amrutha Abhiyaana

The Graama Panchayath Arogya Amrutha Abhiyaana (GPAAA), a first-of-its-kind initiative in the country launched by the Government of Karnataka, hopes to usher in new synergy among the Gram Panchayats, communities and the health facilities in rural areas of the state. The program involves the multisectoral coordination of the Karnataka state departments of RDPR, and Health and Family Welfare, in partnership with KHPT, and with the support of the United States Agency for International Development (USAID).



Components of the GPAAA



Vision

The vision of the GPAAA is to take services to the doorstep of every poor household in rural Karnataka through the close collaboration of Panchayat functionaries such as the Panchayat Development Officer, members of the newlyestablished Gram Panchayat Task Force and health services staff from health and wellness centres, such as the ASHA, Middle-level Health Practitioner (MLHP), and ANM.

The GPAAA integrates the Covid Muktha Gram Panchayat and Kshaya Muktha Gram Panchayat campaigns with the aim of leveraging the strengths of Panchayats and the frontline workers of the health department to build healthy, TB-free and Covid-free villages.

As a long-term goal, the Panchayats will also address vulnerabilities including NCDs, mental health issues, elimination of child marriages, and malnutrition, among others.

Covering 2816 Gram Panchayats of 110 Talukas in 13 districts Bagalkot, Ballari, Belagavi, Chamarajanagara, Davanagere, Gadag, Kalaburgi, Koppala, Mandya, Mysure, Raichuru, Vijayapura, Yadgir


Operationalizing the Abhiyaana

The Abhiyaana creates the opportunity for the RDPR's Gram Panchayat Task Force and the Health Ministry's Health and Wellness Centres (HWCs) to support each other through the promotion and implementation of testing, screening and awareness programs.

The GPAAA be will operationalised through the proactive leadership of the Gram Panchayat Task Force specifically for the promotion, awareness building and creation of an enabling and stigma-free environment at the Gram Panchayat and village level. This will be followed by delivery of testing and referral services through HWCs and Jan Arogya Samiti (JAS) functionaries such as the ASHAs, MLHPs and ANMs to the last mile vulnerable populations.

The Abhiyaana will aim to increase reach through engagement with village- level community structures such as Self-help Groups, MNREGA groups, School Development and Monitoring Committees (SDMCs), Village Health Sanitation and Nutrition Committees (VHSNCs) etc. The village level health sub-committees like the VHSNCs will help strengthen the linkages between the health functionaries and the abovementioned community structures through regular interactions to assess community needs and respond to those needs in the form of point-of-contact testing and referral services, as well as through awareness and health promotion initiatives.

The GPAAA is a novel initiative that will help create a decentralised convergence model for health at the lowest level between both the demand and supply sides for the health of the grassroot communities. This model envisages the Gram Panchayat Task Force members, HWC and JAS functionaries working together to reach community structures at panchayat and village levels.

The GPAAA was launched in the platinum jubilee year of Indian independence by Shri K S Eshwarappa, Minister, RDPR, at Suvarna Soudha in Belagavi on August 30, 2021. Shri L K Atheeq, Principal Secretary, RDPR, also addressed the Zilla Panchayat Chief Executive Officers (CEOs). Shri Darshan H V, Zilla Panchayat CEO, Belagavi, presided over the event. Shri K S Eshwarappa handed over the Gram Panchayat kit to four Gram Panchayat groups and released the IEC materials with dignitaries on the dais. The event was attended by 32 CEOs of Zilla Panchayaths across the state, as well as senior officials of the Government of Karnataka.

Role of KHPT

KHPT, with support from USAID, is providing the following support to the Government of Karnataka for implementation of the Abhiyaana in 13 districts; this in alignment with its vision of empowering and promoting health among grassroots communities.

Collaborating on IEC campaigns that promote Covid-appropriate behaviours and Covid vaccination at the village level



In the longer term, support health promotion and disease prevention activities that include screening for Noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) and communicable diseases like TB and linkages to continuumof-care service packages
